## **NEW VISIONS**

Change is in the air; not just falling leaves and the turn of the season as the days shorten into winter but change in the form of exciting new opportunities.

With Sister Pamela's departure and the uncertainty over the future of the All Hallows House there is much discussion afoot about the future purpose of the buildings on the Julian pilgrimage site.

There is a desire to update both the Julian Centre and All Hallows House to create a Julian Pilgrim Site that adequately reflects and responds to the growing interest in Julian's writing. Father Brendan and Presvytera Sharon Pelphrev have outlined a vision for a future Julian Pilarim site which might include/ combine a welcome and information centre including audio visual displays about Julian: a café and book store and library: a spiritual retreat centre: an education/research/study/ publishing centre; and a spiritual counselling centre.

Canon Andy Bryant, chair of the Community of All Hallows Trust is bringing together a group of people representing a wide spectrum of interest in Julian, including Christians from many denominations. academics, writers and historians to discuss a new vision for Julian's shrine in the 21st century. The Friends will be active participants in this process and with this in mind the Trustees are having a brainstorming day to explore what is the unique contribution that the Friends can make to this opportunity. There is broad agreement from the Trustees that we are ready and welcome for change and open for discussion of new ways of collaborating with others to do justice to Julian's historical and spiritual importance on the King Street site.

## SOLITUDE & PILGRIMAGE RETREAT - MY REFLECTIONS

The retreat, on 12th and 13th October 2018, took place in the sacred space of St Julian's Church in Norwich, and was facilitated by the Rt Revd Stephen Platten, Dean of Norwich 1995-2003.

Stephen gave four addresses over the two day retreat - themes from the book of Margery Kempe, from Lynn, and the Divine Revelations of Love by Julian of Norwich. Medieval contemporaries, he talked of their very different lives, personalities; their pilgrimage and spirituality.

40 to 50 participants keenly listened to Stephen's addresses, interspersed with readings and silences, with hospitality at the Julian Centre. We were blessed with glorious late summer sun, enabling us to have quiet time in the Julian garden.

There was time for thoughtful contribution, fruitful discussion and insights from both books. We explored our solitude and our shared pilgrimage; our prayerfulness and contemplation; our need for

assurance, enfolded in God's love as we journey.

Margery's and Julian's faith and hope through their enlightenment, and the very real revelations speak to us vividly today. They draw us outward and onward with a deepening in-dwelling in Christ - drawing us to openness and oneness.



#### A FLOWING INSPIRATION

Hot on the heels of the first meeting of Howard's Book Club, we received delivery of two new Julian books. First, a lovely new book from Sr. Elizabeth Ruth Obbard, richly illustrated – and secondly, a new book from Veronica Mary Rolf in IVP's 'Explorer's Guide' series.

Veronica Mary Rolf is a former actress, scholar, playwright, lecturer on Theology and Christian Mysticism, among many other accomplishments. Having taught many courses on Julian she is keen for others to do so too, hence this volume. With its dramatic cover it took my eye, so I began to read – and couldn't put it down! She is an excellent communicator and takes the reader along with her on a romp through Julian's times, before exploring the Revelations one by one. Each includes a substantial quotation from Julian's text, than Veronica Mary's overview of it. 'Julian Gems' are highlighted. Her style is lively and engaging and it is an excellent accompaniment to Howard's chosen translation.

Sr. Elizabeth's book 'A Revelation of Love' is also an excellent accompaniment, but in a different way. Sr. Elizabeth is an enclosed Carmelite Sister, well known through her beautifully illustrated writings on the mystics in the New City 'For Everyone' series, this present volume being the latest. Sr. Elizabeth uses a translation of the Paris Manuscript by Josef Pischlar MHM, which she has edited and rewritten at his request, his first language is not English. She has arranged the text in 'Showings', rather than chapters. This work is richly illustrated with Sr. Elizabeth's beautiful 'Roundels' - simplicity, in black and white, which seem to distil key points of the Showings into visual 'aides memoires', encouraging the reader to pause, reflect and absorb the meaning.





#### SR ELIZABETH OBBARD'S GIFT

The Julian Centre has also received a very special gift from Sr. Elizabeth; a book hand written and hand illustrated in colour (see main image opposite), which distils the text into a short passage, then concentrates it further into one simple drawing. This beautiful book is kept, securely, in the Reference section of the Julian Centre Library but is available for inspection on request. (So do visit and 'taste and see'.)

It was her two lovely books and the thought that doodling is a good way of note taking in lectures, or even in a Book Club discussion, which led to a few of us from the Book Club meeting to explore the text with crayons, paint, pastels etc. in a silent prayerful atmosphere. So we have met from 10am to 12noon on alternate Fridays, ending with a simple, voluntary sharing of what Julian's text has revealed to each of us, followed by the Grace. Our next meeting on 7th December will include a soup lunch, as it is on a Book Club day. A Volunteer.
